

# Gombe 60: Jane's Story

2020 marks a major milestone for Dr Jane Goodall and the whole Roots & Shoots family around the world. The 14 July will celebrate 60 years to the day since Jane first set foot in what is now the Gombe Stream National Park in Tanzania. She travelled there as a young woman to study the wild chimpanzees that call it home, and her ground-breaking work changed not only her life, but our scientific understanding of these amazing animals and of the world around us.

### In this activity you and your students will:

- ► Learn about Jane's work in the Gombe Stream National Park
- ► Create a storyboard or cartoon strip of Jane's life and work.

#### objectives

This project will help students see how scientific study, like Jane's research with chimpanzees in Gombe, can help us discover the best ways to protect our environment and the amazing animals that live there.

#### What do I need to make it work?

For this activity, you'll need:

- ► A computer and internet connection
- ▶ Paper, pens, scissors, glue and access to a printer

#### What things will my students create?


► A storyboard or cartoon

### Discover Jane's work in Gombe

As part of the Gombe 60 celebrations the Jane Goodall Institute has put together some great resources that tell Jane's story.

#### Take the Google Earth Walk

To begin to discover Jane's story and some of the highlights of her work, you can go on this Google Earth Walk around Gombe itself: bit.ly/gombe-tour.



As you journey along you can read about some of Jane's experiences and findings as well as meet some of the chimpanzees along the way!

As you take the tour, take a notepad and pen with you and try to answer these questions:

- 1. What are the main events in Jane's story?
- 2. What character (animals or people) did you meet?
- 3. What amazing things did Jane discover?
- 4. What happened as a result of these discoveries?

### (reate your storyboard

Now that you have gathered information about Jane's story, you can turn that into a simple storyboard or cartoon.

#### Plan the story

- ▶ Write out what the main events in Jane's story by listing the characters you met and the main thing that happened.
- ► For each event, think what images or drawings you might need to show or explain that event.
- ► Finally write a short sentence that explains what is happening in each scene or event.

#### Prepare the images or illustrations

To create your storyboard you can either draw all the pictures yourself or print, cut and stick images from websites like the storymap (bit.ly/jgi-storymap) or Google Image searches to create a collage story. If you are drawing the pictures yourself you might want to practice drawing some of the characters and scenes first. Here is a how to draw a chimp video that could be helpful: bit.ly/draw-a-chimp.

You can also purchase and download *The Colours of Gombe* colouring book. Using the book you can get to know more of Jane's story and explore the amazing world of Gombe by colouring it in! You may also be able to use scenes or elements from the illustrations to base your own drawings on for your storyboard. You can download the Gombe colouring book here: bit.ly/colours-of-gombe


