The Roots & Shoots: Mission Possible Concept

Set in an alternate reality where Dr Jane Goodall is “Chief Agent J”, head of a secret organisation, Roots & Shoots: Mission Possible provides sets of activities for teachers to use both in and out of the classroom to encourage pupils to learn about people, animals and their local environment.

Each activity set is themed around a particular mission. Missions are introduced via the **Mission Briefing Comic**, in which Chief Agent J receives a distress call from a future world. In order to find out what the problem is, Chief Agent J despatches one of the time travelling **Chrono-Bots** (serial numbers **Root5** and **5Hoot5**) to find a potential future world where a major disaster has occurred. By taking action today you and your pupils can help prevent this disaster occurring! The accompanying **Activities** provide all sorts of ways that you can do this, ready for you to use.

As well as providing the activities, the website also presents you with a place for you to write up what you've been doing, sharing your good work with other schools in the UK and the Roots & Shoots international family. Feel free to write up anything that you have been doing that is beneficial to the Environment, Animals or People, not just things based on our activity sheets. All written up projects will be considered for a Roots & Shoots award that could see you and your pupils meeting Dr Jane Goodall. The Waterworld

In the Waterworld activity set

(<http://www.rootnsnshoots.org.uk/blog/category/activities/waterworld/>), Chrono-bot RooT5 travels to a future where East Anglia is flooded and marshy. This is due to the combination of climate change and isostatic rebound of the UK, but it's not the water that's the problem, it's the drug-resistant malarial mosquitoes that are everywhere.

If more effort had been put into fighting malaria and avoiding the build up of drug resistance a bit earlier, this could be stopped before it happens. The Waterworld activities are all about what can be done to help...

What are the Waterworld activities about and how can I use them?

The Waterworld activities are about exploring the **people**, **animal** and **environment** consequences of the future world outlined in the briefing comic. People activities help your students learn about what it is like to live in a marshy environment where risk of malarial infection is prevalent; animal activities help your students learn more about what sort of animals thrive in watery habitats by looking at local ponds and waterways; and environment activities concentrate on the risk of malarial infection how we can improve the efforts to tackle it on a bigger scale and more effective scale.

In order to best use the activities, we suggest that you:

- Print out copies of the Mission Briefing comic and use them to introduce the background concept to your class
- Choose one or more of the available activities to carry out with your class. For example, you might want to choose one people activity, one animal activity and one environment activity, or you may wish to concentrate on just one aspect.
- After completing the activities, discuss with your class how what they have learnt can help with the future world. Think about:
- What have they done to help stop the future world happening.



- What they have learnt about how to live in a flooded and marshy environment that could be helpful to inhabitants of the future world.
- How disease control can be improved to try and stop malarial infection happening in the future.

Once you have finished, please take the time to write up what you have been doing on the website, and we will consider you and your school for a Roots & Shoots Award.
